Moving Forward into a Bright Future "A world of possibilities is ahead of me!"

You gave Victoria and her daughter "a world of possibilities"

"I'm going to be the best mom I can be!"

Victoria grew up in an unstable environment, shuttled from one family member to another. Along the way, she suffered abuse, never knowing what it felt like to be wanted and loved.

As an adult, Victoria made poor choices in her search for acceptance. She followed one boyfriend into a life of drug addiction and crime, landing in jail for three years.

Life got even tougher when Victoria was released from jail. "I was right back out there," she recalls, "fending for myself." She was deep into addiction, homeless and alone.

When Victoria became pregnant late in 2022, she wondered what would happen to her baby. After two miscarriages, she feared this child would also be lost. She gave birth to L'Marie in August 2023, thankful that her daughter had survived, but knowing she had no way to care for her.

Victoria and her baby stayed with a friend for a few days. "I didn't have anywhere to live, and I didn't know where I was going to get my next can of formula," she says. Then social services came to her door, and Victoria handed her precious daughter into their care.

"When they took her, it broke my heart, but I knew it was the right thing for her," Victoria says. It was also the right thing for Victoria. She was set on a course to get her own life on track, which included Union Gospel Mission of Tarrant County. On her first day here, Victoria vowed to succeed. "I didn't want to be on the street again. I wanted to stay clean. I wanted to do things right and get my daughter back."

With your support, God's grace and her own determination, Victoria regained custody of L'Marie last July.

She is working and living in UGM-TC's Transitional Housing Program until she can afford a place of her own. "I'm going to be the best mom that I can be. I'm ready to give her the life I never had."

Victoria tells you, "A world of possibilities is ahead of me! Thanks to everyone who loved me and supported me throughout my journey."

Giving Is in Their DNA

When Sean Julius returned to Fort Worth from California, his mother, Trudy, was overjoyed. A volunteer at Union Gospel Mission of Tarrant County for 15 years, she lost little time asking her son to join her. And he said yes.

"Living in the San Francisco area, I saw a lot of homeless people," Sean says. "It broke my heart to see people on the street, but I was so busy. Here, my schedule is lighter, so I can volunteer like I wanted to."

Trudy and Sean currently help out in the administrative offices, but both started out working in the kitchen - and they

are open to pitching in wherever they are needed. Whatever they do, they feel blessed to be together. "We go out to eat afterwards," Trudy says, "and spend some quality time."

Sean's time is still at a premium. In addition to his career in Human Resources, he is finishing a master's degree in Christian counseling and studying for his LPCA (Licensed Professional Counselor Associate).

> But giving back is deeply important to him. "We're supposed to take care of each other," he says.

"I want to be a veterinarian and take care of pets." -Jasmine




I want to be a gymnast because I like doing lots of flips and acrobatics." -Ridi
